NMED Issues “Boil Water Alert” for South Hills Water Company in Bernalillo County

(Santa Fe, NM) –The New Mexico Environment Department’s Drinking Water Bureau advised the South Hills Water Company to issue a “boil water order” for its water system.

NMED issued the advisory on July 27th after bacteriological contamination that exceeded the Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) for E. coli was discovered in drinking water from the water system. NMED requires South Hills Water Company water system, a small subdivision located near the intersection of Coors Blvd. SW and Pajarito Rd. SW in Bernalillo County with 200 connections, to notify its consumers of the finding. The water supplied to adjacent areas by other water suppliers is not affected and is not under this boil water notice.

Consumers of water from the South Hills Water Company water system are advised to boil water for five minutes before drinking, cooking and dishwashing or to use bottled water if at all possible.

The presence of E. coli in water indicates that the water may have been in contact with sewage or animal wastes, and could contain disease-causing organisms. Most strains of E. coli are harmless and live in the intestines of healthy humans and animals. However, a positive test for E. coli in the drinking water supply may indicate the presence of dangerous strains of E. coli or other disease-causing organisms, which are sometimes found in sewage or animal wastes. These types of organisms may cause severe gastrointestinal illness and, in rare cases, even death. Children, the elderly and immunocompromised individuals are at an increased risk for illness.

Actions have been initiated to disinfect the water system and identify possible sources of contamination. The Drinking Water Bureau will continue to assist the water system and help identify the source of the problem.
