

LEGAL NOTICE and Preliminary Determination for an Air Quality Permit for DCP Midstream, L.P.

DCP Midstream, L.P., 10 Desta Dr, Suite 400 West, Midland, Texas 79705, has submitted an air quality permit application to the Air Quality Bureau (aqb), New Mexico Environment Department (NMED) for an air quality permit to modify the Rat Camp Compressor Station. The application file has been assigned Permit No. 0940-M3 and TEMPO Agency Interest ID No. 279. The exact location of the facility is at latitude 32 degrees, 56 minutes, 28 seconds and longitude -104 degrees, 14 minutes, 31 seconds. To aid in locating this facility, the approximate location is 7.7 miles east/southeast of Lake Arthur, New Mexico in Eddy County.

The proposed modification will consist of:

1. Adding fugitive emissions to the facility permit
2. Removing two condensate tanks: one 75-barrel (bbl) tank and one 110-bbl tank
3. Adding two 210-bbl condensate tanks
4. Revising the calculation methodology for tank emissions
5. Increasing condensate plus water throughput to 100,000 gallons per year
6. Increasing condensate loadout to 60,000 gallons per year
7. Updating hazardous air pollutant emissions for two engines
8. Adding compressor blowdown/startup/warm up (CBD) emissions to the facility permit
9. Adding Routine or Predictable Emissions During Startup, Shutdown, and Scheduled Maintenance (SSM) emissions to the facility permit
10. Adding a 3,000 gallon lube oil tank

Total air pollutant emissions to the atmosphere are estimated to be approximately Nitrogen Oxides (NO_x) at 48 tons per year (tpy); Carbon Monoxide (CO) at 48 tpy; Volatile Organic Compounds (VOC) at 26 tpy; Total Suspended Particulate Matter (TSP) at 1.1 tpy, Particulate Matter 10 microns or less (PM₁₀) at 1.1 tpy, and Particulate Matter 2.5 microns or less (PM_{2.5}) at 1.1 tpy. The facility is a minor, < 100,000 tpy CO₂e, source of green house gas emissions. These emission estimates could change slightly during the course of the Department's review of the application.

The NMED has conducted a preliminary review of the information submitted with the permit application and found that only volatile organic compounds (VOCs) are increasing due to this modification. VOCs are a pre-cursor to ozone. Pre-construction air dispersion modeling is not required for VOCs and ozone. To determine compliance with national ambient air quality standards, NMED monitors ambient ozone concentrations. A full review will evaluate the estimated emission rates and determine compliance with air quality regulations.

Based on the applicant's analysis, a preliminary determination is that this facility will comply with the requirements of Title 20, New Mexico Administrative Code (NMAC), Chapter 2, Parts 3, 61, 72, 73, 75 and 82; 40 CFR 50; 40 CFR 63 Subparts A and ZZZZ; and the New Mexico Air Quality Control Act. Therefore, the preliminary intent of NMED is to issue the air quality permit on or before October 17, 2012. This source is a minor source according to 20.2.74 NMAC, PSD.

To ensure compliance with state and federal air regulations, the permit is expected to include conditions that limit the emissions, production rate, and conditions that will require record keeping and reporting to the Department.

The permit application is available for review in electronic or hard copy at the Air Quality Bureau Office, 1301 Siler Road, Building B, Santa Fe, New Mexico. The permit application is also available at the NMED Roswell Field Office, located at 1914 West Second, Roswell, NM 88201 for public review.

All interested persons have thirty (30) days from the date this notice is published, to notify the Department in writing of their interest in the permit application. The written comments should refer to the company name, site name and Permit No. (or send a copy of this notice along with your comments). The written comments shall state the nature of the issues raised and how it relates to the requirements of applicable state and federal air quality regulations and the Clean Air Act. The written comments should be mailed to Sam Speaker, New Mexico Environment Dept., Air Quality Bureau, Permit Section, 1301 Siler Road, Building B, Santa Fe, New Mexico 87507-3113.

The Department will notify all persons, who have provided written comments, as to when and where the Department's analysis may be reviewed. Although all written comments will be made part of the public record, any person who does not express interest in writing prior to the end of this first thirty (30) day period will not receive such notification.

If the Department receives written public comment prior to the end of the Department's thirty (30) day public notice, the Department's analysis will be made available for review for thirty (30) days at the NMED district or field office nearest to the source before the permit will be issued. Written comments on the analysis or permit application may be submitted to the Department during this second thirty (30) day period or at any time before the permit is issued or denied.
