Purpose

The New Mexico Environment Department ("NMED" or "Department") developed this Public Involvement Plan ("Plan") to provide public participation opportunities and information that may be needed to participate in the Regional Haze State Implementation Plan Revision (RH SIPr). The RH SIPr is being undertaken pursuant to the federal code of regulations, Part 51, Subpart P, which requires NMED to develop and submit to EPA a revised RH SIPr to protect visibility at federal Class I Areas. The nine Class I Areas in New Mexico are Bandelier Wilderness Area; Bosque del Apache Wilderness Area; Carlsbad Caverns National Park; Gila Wilderness Area; Pecos Wilderness Area; Salt Creek Wilderness Area; San Pedro Parks Wilderness Area; Wheeler Peak Wilderness Area; and White Mountain Wilderness Area.

The Air Quality Bureau ("AQB" or "Bureau") has developed this Plan to increase transparency regarding the planning and decision-making processes. This Plan integrates information about potentially affected communities and identifies resources needed by the Bureau to successfully incorporate community participation activities into the decision-making process. The Plan identifies the NMED staff and resources needed to accomplish these activities.

In developing this Plan, community participation needs across the State were assessed to ensure appropriate promotion of public outreach, by identifying whether there is a combination of environmental and demographic factors (e.g., low-income communities, minority communities, limited English proficient individuals, linguistically isolated households, etc.) that may impact public participation. This assessment identifies community outreach needs, provides for public access opportunities beyond statutory requirements, and supports the provision of adequate public access to information about the RH SIPr.

The RH SIPr may require public participation throughout different stages of planning and decision-making. The Bureau will follow this Plan, designed to ensure nondiscriminatory access to all applicable public participation opportunities related to policy, regulatory actions and statutory requirements.

Project Overview

All states and local air agencies must either submit a RH SIPr by July 31, 2021 or risk the imposition of a Federal Implementation Plan by EPA. Tribes may also submit a RH SIPr but are not required to do so. NMED is in communication with EPA Region 6 and intends to submit an approvable RH SIPr as soon as possible.

Visibility is affected by many factors, including industrial source emissions, blowing dust, and smoke. The goal of the RH SIPr is to report on the progress of visibility improvement at New Mexico's 9 Class I Areas, evaluate current programs to determine whether they are adequately protective of visibility, and determine strategies for further reducing haze (and increasing visibility) by controlling anthropogenic sources of haze-related pollutant emissions.

Because haze is regional in nature, significant consultation with other states, tribes and local air agencies is required. Additionally, consultation with federal land managers is required. The Western Regional Air Partnership (WRAP) is a regional planning organization for the western states that is facilitating and conducting a significant portion of the technical analyses, with the help of member state staff.

Planning for the RH SIPr is a multi-year effort, which began in 2017 with the publication of the revised Regional Haze Rule. Four phases of outreach for the Department's planning process will include: (1) an introductory phase during which outreach will focus on educating the public about regional haze planning; (2) an analysis sharing phase where public meetings will be held describing possible strategies for achieving visibility goals; (3) a SIP revision phase where draft revisions will be shared with stakeholders for informal comment; and (4) a proposal and hearing phase for formal comment prior to a public hearing on the RH SIPr.

Because Class I Areas are located throughout the State, this project is expected to receive Statewide interest. Thus, outreach will be Statewide as well.

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Community Description / LEP Analysis

To address potential or existing environmental justice areas, the Bureau completed an initial screening of the potentially affected communities, using the EJSCREEN tool developed by the EPA and the US Census Bureau website as support. This tool helps identify communities with demographic factors which may benefit from a variety of approaches for notification and outreach communication. Statistics are derived from American Community Survey reports (2019 – 2023) via the U.S. Census Bureau Website.

The results of the American Community Survey Reports indicate that a significantly larger percentage of population (67.8%) in New Mexico are persons of color, compared with the persons of color population (44.3%) of the United States. Households in New Mexico are 5.2% linguistically isolated, which is comparable to the U.S. average (4.2%). Spanish is the predominant language in these households. The per capita income is \$34,823 in New Mexico; which is lower than the average of U.S. per capita income (\$43,289).

The results of this screening suggest that attention should be paid to the linguistic and logistical needs of the low income, minority, linguistically isolated and limited English proficiency populations. Attention should be paid to additional language assistance, especially Spanish, but also Navajo.

Historically, participation by LEP individuals in New Mexico-led rulemaking activities has been through organized environmental groups, such as Diné C.A.R.E. (Citizens Against Ruining our Environment), or Juntos: Our Air, Our Water, that participate in other non-regulatory issues, such as public meetings regarding VW Settlement Funds or issues related to the Four Corners Air Quality Group. Participation by Spanish-only stakeholders has recently been limited to Albuquerque/Bernalillo County. The Bureau arranged for live translation services at the public information meetings on the VW Settlement held in Albuquerque and Las Cruces in 2017. Members of Juntos attended the VW Settlement meeting in Albuquerque, advocating for the purchase of electric school buses. No Spanish-only speakers attended the meeting in Las Cruces. Public notices for the public meetings on the proposed TSP Repeal and Fugitive Dust Rule were provided in Spanish, but we did not receive any requests for translation for those meetings. Despite the historically infrequent participation by LEP individuals in similar proceedings, it is still important for the Bureau to incorporate the linguistic and communication needs of these communities when conducting public outreach and participation activities, to foster and support further participation by these communities.

To help accomplish this, the Bureau will translate all public notices into Spanish. The same materials will also be provided to the various Native American Tribes, Pueblos and Nations for distribution. Should

additional Spanish or Navajo translation services be requested, the following are average costs associated with various services:

Costs associated with translation: \$1,000;

Costs associated with providing a language interpreter: \$2,500 – 5,000, depending on the

number and length of the proceeding(s) and the language assistance requested;

Costs for a court reporter: \$2,000.

The Bureau strives to make public participation efforts as inclusive as possible within budget and time limitations. In addition, interpretation services will be made available upon request to the appropriate contact person listed in the "Contacts" section of this Plan.

The RH SIPr is very important to the State, local governments, and industry since submitting the required approvable SIPr avoids the imposition of a Federal Implementation Plan. The RH SIPr is important to the Department to not only meet federal standards, but also to carry out its mission of protecting the air quality for the State's citizens. Neighborhood citizens and environmental organizations should view this planning effort as important for protecting their health as well as for protecting the scenic vistas at New Mexico's Class I Areas. Protecting visibility at Class I Areas is of prime importance to the Federal Land Managers (FLMs).

Details of Outreach Activities

Based on the demographics outlined above, the history of public involvement for related projects, and projected impacts to potentially affected communities, the Bureau will provide important documents and public notices in Spanish as well as English, and will also provide documents to Native American Tribes, Pueblos and Nations for distribution as they deem appropriate. All notices will include information on how to request additional materials in another language or how to request other communication assistance through NMED. Due to the interstate nature of this project NMED will work with the WRAP to conduct outreach, coordination, and consultation to FLMs, EPA, Native American Tribes, and other affected states. WRAP has developed a guidance document, "WRAP Communication Framework for Regional Haze Planning," to help states and other agencies work together.

The following table offers information on how the public will be invited to participate in this project. Note that dates may be approximate. Notices will contain final dates, and specific locations and times.
