## GRANT INSTRUCTIONS

### 1. PURPOSE

To provide annual grant funding to support projects that will:

- Protect the health and welfare of the environment and current and future residents of New Mexico by preventing and abating illegal dumpsites
- Promote environmentally sound methods for reuse and recycling
- Encourage economic development, community development and collaboration that promotes the efficient and sustainable use of resources, sustainable recycling and a cleaner and healthier environment

### 2. ELIGIBILITY: PARTICIPATING ORGANIZATIONS

A municipality, county, Indian nation, pueblo or tribe, land grant community, cooperative association (see definitions) or solid waste authority that meets eligibility requirements established by the New Mexico Environmental Improvement Board.

### 3. TIMEFRAME

Grants are awarded on an annual basis. Grant applications will be accepted from late December 2008 through April 3, 2009 at 5:00 p.m. Grant applications will be reviewed by the Recycling and Illegal Dumping Alliance in the beginning of May and awarded by the New Mexico Environment Department in mid-May. The awarded grants are for the period July 1, 2009 until June 30, 2010. Again, successfully funded grant projects must be completed by June 30, 2010. A project timeline with milestones will be required if the proposed project is successfully funded.

**To be considered, completed applications must be received by or postmarked by 5:00 PM, Friday, April 3, 2009.**

### 4. ASSESSMENT PROCESS AND CRITERIA

The New Mexico Environment Department will receive grant applications and will conduct a review based on the assessment criteria listed in Attachment One—Grant Application Score Sheet. The application form is structured around these criteria and the available assessment points are listed at the end of each section of the application form(s). All applications will be forwarded to the New Mexico Recycling and Illegal Dumping Alliance to review and make recommendations to the Secretary of the Environment Department for final approval.

### 5. APPLICATION FORMAT

It is essential the application must be consistent with this Form provided (and in the latest version available) and must not exceed the word limits listed. You must include 1) A completed Community Plan, and 2) a completed Recycling OR Illegal Dumping application form. It is preferred that applications be provided in an electronic Microsoft Word document, or PDF.

### 6. TYPES OF PROJECTS TO BE FUNDED

The following are examples of the types of projects that would be considered eligible for funding:

#### ***Illegal Dumping***

- Eliminate or reduce in amount, degree, or intensity illegal dumping sites
- Research, innovative and/or prevention programs, education, and community clean up days

- Activities that would help track illegal dumpsites
- Development or expansion of services of small collection centers that will facilitate the proper disposal of material as an alternative to illegal dumping
- Development of an action plan to address any of the above

### ***Recycling***

- Activities that will increase access to recycling
- Research and development for recycling programs, education, infrastructure and other capital equipment for recycling, recycling processing equipment, field trials, and/or market development activities
- Activities that will expand an existing program or services
- Development of an action plan to address any of the above

### ***Priority projects for 2009***

Programs that target the following activities or materials will be given the highest priority (in no particular order)

- Eliminating or reducing in amount, degree, or intensity illegal dumping sites or preventing future illegal dumping
- Motor Oil (Required by law to be separated from trash at a landfill for recycling)
- Lead acid car batteries (Required by law to be separated from trash at a landfill for recycling)
- Corrugated Cardboard OCC (Collected, sold, and shipped to a viable recycling market)
- Newspaper ONP #7 (Collected, sold, and shipped to a viable recycling market)

**Recycling proposals that do not target motor oil, lead acid batteries, cardboard, or newspaper will only be considered after proposals that do target one or more of these materials.**

## **7. TYPES OF ITEMS/PROJECTS THAT WILL NOT BE FUNDED**

The following types of items will not be eligible for funding (although may constitute in-kind in support of the project):

- Operating costs associated with on-going waste management or compliance activities
- Remediation costs for which an organization is already liable
- Recycling programs or equipment that will not provide and assist in providing access to recycling
- Tire recycling activities (funded under a separate program)
- Clean up of illegal dumpsites which contain tires (funded under a separate program)
- Preparation of the grant application
- Staff salaries
- Redundant equipment
- Recycling or processing activities or purchasing recyclable products which utilize less than ninety-five percent of recyclable materials from sources in New Mexico.
- Litter clean-up and abatement (contact New Mexico Clean and Beautiful for information regarding their grants for such programs)

## **8. LEVEL AND METHOD OF FUNDING**

The total pool of funding available is approximately \$400,000 for FY10, to be split equally between proposed illegal dumping and recycling projects. Applications that provide in-kind or financial contributions will be given priority (see definitions). Grant expenses will be reimbursed by written request, with the final payment being dependant on the completion and submission of a Project Completion Survey (provided by NMED) documenting the process and outcomes. The aim of this survey is to provide information that will assist other communities or organizations improve their programs and to help NMED improve its grant process.

**9. DEFINITIONS**

TERM	DEFINITION
<p>Access to recycling  (As defined by the New Mexico Solid Waste Management Plan)</p>	<p>A Participating Organization is providing “access to recycling” if they can:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1). Identify at least one entity (referred to here as “Service Center”) in the Participating Organization’s area that collects or accepts each of the materials targeted for recycling as listed as the highest priority in “Priorities: Types of Projects to be Funded”</li> <li>2). Show that a Service Center exists for each of the targeted materials so that 50% of the population served by the Participating Organization has access to recycling of those items without driving more than 30 minutes to a Service Center. Note: Access to recycling does not have to be at a landfill.</li> </ol>
<p>Cooperative association (as defined by the RAID Act)</p>	<p>“Cooperative association” means a refuse disposal district created pursuant to the Refuse Disposal Act, a sanitation district created pursuant to the Water and Sanitation District Act, a special district created pursuant to the Special District Procedures Act or other associations created pursuant to the Joint Powers Agreements Act or the Solid Waste Authority Act.</p>
<p>Illegal dumping (as defined by the US Environmental Protection Agency)</p>	<p>The disposal of waste in an unpermitted area. It is also referred to as “open dumping,” “fly dumping,” and “midnight dumping,” because materials are often dumped in open areas, from vehicles along roadsides, and late at night. Illegally dumped wastes are primarily non-hazardous materials that are dumped to avoid either disposal fees or the time and effort required for proper disposal.</p>
<p>In-kind</p>	<p>Non-monetary contribution from the participating organization i.e., labor, staff salaries, equipment and materials, recycling costs associated with special events.</p>
<p>Market development (as defined by the RAID Act)</p>	<p>Activities conducted to expand or create markets for recyclable and reusable materials. Could include field trials of recycled products, processing of recycled materials for resale to a new market.</p>
<p>NMRIDA</p>	<p>New Mexico Recycling and Illegal Dumping Alliance.</p>
<p>Participating organization (as defined by the New Mexico Solid Waste Management Plan)</p>	<p>Grant applicant that complies with specific requirements.</p>
<p>Recycling (as defined by the RAID Act)</p>	<p>Any process, by which recyclable materials are collected, separated or processed, reused or returned to use in the form of raw materials or products.</p>
<p>Reuse (as defined by the RAID Act)</p>	<p>The return of a commodity into the economic stream without a change to its original form.</p>
