## HB 108: Solid Waste Solvency Bill

Solid waste programs protect public health and keep New Mexico's air, land and water clean.



## How does it work?

Properly managing solid waste is a bedrock environmental protection activity that prevents contamination from entering our air, land, and water.

Solid waste facilities in New Mexico pay permit application fees once every 20 years to fund approximately 2% of the overall solid waste program annual costs. Current fee revenues are not enough to fund even one full time position in the Environment Department's solid waste team. Permit fees have not been adjusted to account for inflation since 2007.

The Solid Waste Solvency Bill creates the non-reverting Solid Waste Permit Fund, establishes a new maximum fee cap of \$5,000 per year and requires a two-tiered fee structure based on population served. It also expands eligible activities to include program administration and permit oversight costs and allows for an annual adjustment to fees to account for inflation.

This bill does not directly increase fees.

If the bill is passed, the Environment Department must then petition the Environmental Improvement Board to adopt a new fee structure that properly funds and secures essential solid waste services that benefit all New Mexicans including:

- Permitting landfills, infectious waste processors and other solid waste facilities to ensure they are operated in a manner that controls pollution
- Training and certifying solid waste operators to safely and responsibly operate facilities
- Educating New Mexicans on waste management and recycling
- Administering grants to local communities to clean up illegal dumpsites and improve recycling
- · Responding to complaints of illegal dumping
- Inspecting solid waste facilities to ensure compliance with environmental laws

Passage of this bill ensures solvency of the solid waste permitting program and helps stretch critical General Fund appropriations to provide essential solid waste services to the public.

## How will it benefit New Mexico?
