



Resource Management (P-567)

+ \$559,200 + o FTEs

Replace lower indirect cost revenues and support filling vacancies/retaining staff.



Water Protection (P-568)

- + \$2,379,500
- + 9 FTEs

Increase resilient water infrastructure; focus on emerging contaminants; improve drinking water system sampling.



Resource Protection (P-569)

- + \$185,000
- + 2 FTEs

Increase solid & infectious waste oversight and increase compliance inspections.



Environmental Protection (P-570)

- + 2,520,000
- + 15 FTEs

Environmental Health (P-570)

- + 2,325,000
- + 19 FTEs

Ensure the safety of the edibles and topicals cannabis industry.



Key Point: The LFC Budget Recommendation provides NMED with increased transfer authority from <u>restricted</u> special revenue/federal funds but such funding is not an allowable use for the above program areas.

Example: In P-570, the LFC is recommending transfer authority of \$478,000. However, the request for cannabis staffing is not allowable under any of our restricted special revenue/federal funds.
