I. Public Involvement Plan (PIP) Overview

The New Mexico Environment Department (NMED or Department), Surface Water Quality Bureau (SWQB or Bureau) developed this Public Involvement Plan (PIP) for the State of New Mexico Clean Water Act Section 401 Certification of the draft federal permit for the City of Las Cruces East Mesa Water Reclamation Facility (WRF) National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit number NM0030872.

The Bureau encourages the public to learn about and get involved in regulatory decisionmaking opportunities for the NPDES process. The purpose of this PIP is to provide public participation opportunities and information that may be needed to participate in the Clean Water Act Section 401 Certification process.

This PIP integrates information about the community and identifies resources needed by the Bureau to successfully incorporate community participation activities into the decision-making process for the 401 Certification. The PIP identifies the Department staff and resources needed to accomplish these activities.

The Bureau will meet the public participation requirements for the 401 Certification by following this PIP, which includes all applicable policy, regulatory and statutory public participation requirements.

In developing this PIP, community participation needs were assessed to ensure appropriate promotion of public outreach by identifying whether there is a combination of environmental and demographic factors (i.e., low-income community, minority community, limited English proficiency individuals, linguistically isolated households, etc.) that may impact public participation. These factors are presented in Section IV: Location and Demographics. This assessment identifies community outreach needs and provides for public access opportunities above and beyond statutorily mandated requirements and underscores the importance of adequate public access to information about the Section 401 Certification.

As much as possible, public participation and informational activities related to the 401 Certification will be held within the timelines outlined in the table below. This timeline is tentative and subject to change; activities subject to statutory or regulatory deadlines are noted.

III. Regulatory Framework

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) retains permitting authority for the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Program in New Mexico, and as such, drafts permits for facilities that discharge pollutants into surface waters located in New Mexico. The New Mexico Environment Department's role in NPDES permitting is to ensure that federal permits comply with the requirements of state law, including New Mexico's antidegradation requirements. The Department's permit certification process is outlined in Section 401 of the Clean Water Act, and New Mexico's Administrative Code at 20.6.2.2001 NMAC.

The Bureau has three options in a 401 Certification. If there is an existing state law or regulation (such as water quality standards) that requires more stringent limitations than the federal permit, the Bureau can write a <u>condition</u> for that requirement, and EPA must include the condition in the final permit. However, the Bureau cannot condition a permit to make it less stringent. The second option is that the Bureau can <u>comment</u> on the draft permit based on best professional judgement and on-the-ground knowledge of the facility. EPA will consider but may not incorporate suggestions made in comments into the final permit. Thirdly, the Bureau can <u>deny</u> certification of the permit if it will not comply with the applicable sections of the Clean Water Act and appropriate requirements of state law. This would prohibit EPA from issuing the permit.

The federal requirement for public notice of draft NPDES permits issued by EPA Region 6 is at least a 30-day public review and comment period (40 CFR Part 124.10(b)), and the state requirement for 401 Certification is at least a 30-day public comment period (20.6.2.2001 NMAC). Typically, this is accomplished via a joint public notice issued by EPA, which is posted on EPA's public notice website, accompanying all the draft permit documents. EPA posts draft permits for New Mexico facilities which are on public notice on their website: https://www.epa.gov/publicnotices/notices-search/location/New%20Mexico.

The Bureau does not prepare a draft 401 Certification for the public to review, but accepts comments for consideration in the certification during this public notice period. The Bureau cannot provide a draft document for public review due to stringent federal timelines for permit issuance – after EPA's comment period is concluded, the Bureau is required to issue or deny 401

Certification within 45 days from the date that the request to grant certification is received by the Bureau unless circumstances require a longer timeframe (20.6.2.2001.G NMAC). Federal regulations also require that the 401 Certification is received by EPA Region 6 no later than 60 days after the draft permit is mailed unless the Regional Administrator finds that unusual circumstances require a longer time frame (40 CFR Part 124.53(c)(3)). A final copy of the 401 Certification will be sent to EPA Region 6, the applicant and those who submitted comments for consideration in the 401 Certification.

The public participation requirements of specific water quality programs are specified in 40 CFR Section 25.4 and described in New Mexico's Statewide Water Quality Management Plan and Continuing Planning Process (WQMP/CPP¹). At a minimum, the public participation process for New Mexico's water quality programs consists of the following:

- Providing the public with the information and assistance necessary for meaningful involvement;
- Providing a central location of reports, studies, plans, and other documents;
- Maintaining a list of affected or interested parties and stakeholders; and
- Notifying stakeholders in a timely fashion prior to consideration of major decisions (generally at least 30 days).

The Bureau invites the public to either submit comments on EPA's draft NPDES permit for City of Las Cruces East Mesa WRF NPDES permit number NM0030872 directly to EPA Region 6 staff in Dallas, Texas. IV. Location and Demographics

The City of Las Cruces East Mesa WRF NPDES permit number NM0030872 is located in Las Cruces, Dona Ana County, New Mexico.

Demographic Summary

Demographic indicators were obtained from EPA NEPAssist, an environmental justice screening and mapping tool, available on-line at <u>https://nepassisttool.epa.gov/nepassist/nepamap.aspx</u>. NEPAssist is based on nationally consistent data and an approach that combines environmental and demographic indicators in maps and reports. Users choose the geographic area of interest by

indicating a point, line or polygon on the map; users may also choose to select a "buffer" area (up to 10 miles) around the point, line or polygon to better capture the affected community. NEPAssist then provides a report that describes demographic and environmental information for that area, with or without an assigned buffer. The 2017-2021 American Community Survey (ACS) Report link in NEPAssist provides a report with U.S. Census Bureau American Community Survey (ACS) data in PDF format. The 2017-2021 ACS, through NEPAssist, provided quantitative information regarding demographic indicators.

Summary of Site-Specific NEPAssist Inputs

- Community of Concern = City of Las Cruces, Dona Ana County, New Mexico
- Buffer = 10-mile buffer centered on the City of Las Cruces East Mesa Water Reclamation Facility discharge, includes part of the eastern developed area of Las Cruces

The 2017-2021 ACS Report indicates that the total population of the area-of-interest for the City of Las Cruces East Mesa WRF is 145,534; 71 percent of the community identifies as white, 2 percent identifies as Black, 2 percent identifies as American Indian, 1 percent identifies as Asian, 11 percent identifies as some other race, and 12 percent identifies as multiracial. Of the total population, 62 percent identify as Hispanic. The percent of persons that communicate in a language other than English (non-English) at home is 38 percent (51,618 individuals), with 12,904 individuals speaking English "less than very well." The per capita income for the City of Las Cruces area for 2017-2021 is \$26,389, as compared to the national per capita income for 2017-2021 of \$37,638. From the Bureau's NEPAssist analysis, there are 3,178 linguistically isolated households in this community. These results indicate that the percentage of non-English-speaking communication in this community is noteworthy and various demographic factors (i.e. low-income community, minority community, limited English proficiency individuals, Linguistically Isolated Households, etc.) may impact public participation.

V. Public Participation & Outreach Activities

The public may ask questions about NPDES permits at any time. Interested community members do not need to wait for a formal public comment period to contact the Bureau. However, the Bureau emphasizes that to be included in the administrative record, comments solicited by public notices about the draft permit must be submitted during the noticed comment periods, and in accordance with the public notice and 20.6.2.2001 NMAC.

Specific outreach activities related to this draft NPDES permit and the Bureau's 401 Certification process include:

The most direct way to learn about and be involved in the decision-making process for draft NPDES permits is to comment on the federal permit directly to EPA. Relevant comments may also be submitted to the Bureau for the 401 Certification through the NMED Public Comment Portal (<u>https://nmed.commentinput.com/comment/search</u>). As stated in Section III above, the Bureau can only mandate changes to the draft permit if based on state law; however, EPA does consider the Bureau's comments based on best professional judgement. Additionally, the public may request to review documents at the Bureau or one of the information repositories listed below.

Based on the demographics report discussed in the PIP, the Bureau's assessment indicates that additional language assistance (interpretation or translation services) or outreach are needed for this activity, at this time. Basic information about public involvement opportunities will be in English and Spanish and will include information on how to request materials in another language or to speak with Bureau staff through an interpreter. The Bureau has determined that there are adequate resources available within the Department to provide LEP services, if requested or determined necessary. Further details about public participation for this activity are outlined below.

A. Postal Mailing or E-Mailing of Notices to Persons on the Surface Water Quality Bureau's Email List

The Bureau maintains an email list (1,823 email addresses on the general SWQB listserv and 2,216 email addresses on the SWQB NPDES listserv as of March 2024) that includes individuals interested in surface water quality issues and activities. This list is a combination of all previously interested persons who requested the Bureau provide them with information about surface water quality in New Mexico. The Bureau regularly maintains contact information, which is updated or supplemented, if additional information is found. Interested persons providing both an address and email may receive physical mail and an email. Additional individuals, organizations, and other interested parties are added to the email list as requested.
