## Purpose

The New Mexico Environment Department (NMED) developed this Public Involvement Plan (Plan) to provide public participation opportunities and information that may be needed to participate in the inspection of the required annual report for the San Juan Generating Station, pursuant to the 2010 SO<sub>2</sub> Data Requirements Rule. The Air Quality Bureau (Bureau) encourages public participation in regulatory and other planning opportunities, and has developed this Plan to increase transparency regarding the planning and decision-making processes. This Plan integrates information about potentially affected communities and identifies resources provided by the Bureau to successfully incorporate community participation activities into the decision-making process. The Plan identifies the NMED staff and resources needed to accomplish these activities.

In developing this Plan, community participation needs were assessed to ensure appropriate promotion of public outreach by identifying whether there is a combination of environmental and demographic factors (i.e., low income community, minority community, limited English proficiency individuals, linguistically isolated households, etc.) that may impact public participation needs. This assessment identifies community outreach needs, provides for public access opportunities beyond statutory requirements, and supports the provision of adequate public access to information about the annual report on SO<sub>2</sub> emissions at the San Juan Generating Station.

EPA requires that the annual report of SO<sub>2</sub> emissions at the San Juan Generating Station be “available for public inspection.” The Bureau will follow this Plan, specifically designed to ensure nondiscriminatory access to this public participation opportunity related to federal rule requirements.

Details about planned Bureau outreach are provided in this Plan.

## Project Overview

Pursuant to the Data Requirements Rule for the 2010 1-Hour Sulfur Dioxide (SO<sub>2</sub>) Primary National Ambient Air Quality Standard (NAAQS), air agencies are required to submit an annual report to their respective EPA Regional Administrator for areas which demonstrated attainment for the 2010 SO<sub>2</sub> NAAQS by modeling of actual emissions. This report shall document the annual SO<sub>2</sub> emissions of each applicable source and provide an assessment of the cause of any emissions increase from the previous year. The first report is due by July 1 of the calendar year after the effective date of the area’s initial designation.

All areas of New Mexico have been designated attainment/unclassifiable through three rounds of designations by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). As part of the round 3 designation process, the 2015 Data Requirements Rule stipulated that, for areas surrounding sources emitting 2,000 tons per year (TPY) or more of sulfur dioxide, states must characterize air quality in one of three ways: (1) ambient air monitoring; (2) modeling of either actual or allowable emissions; or (3) demonstration of enforceable emissions limitations below the 2,000 TPY threshold.

In New Mexico, the only source emitting above the 2,000 TPY threshold was the San Juan Generating Station (SJGS). This source, working with the Air Quality Bureau, decided to characterize that area’s air quality by modeling actual emissions. Modeling submitted to EPA in January 2017 demonstrated that this area met the 2010 SO<sub>2</sub> Primary NAAQS, using quality-assured data from the SJGS’ continuous emissions monitoring system (CEMS) for the years 2013 - 2015. EPA designated this area and all of San Juan County as attainment/unclassifiable in December 2017.

This Project is moderately important to the Department and the affected communities. The annual report is a federal requirement for continuing to show that San Juan County meets the 2010 Primary SO<sub>2</sub> NAAQS. However, the annual report does not affect any permitting or regulatory action that would negatively affect stakeholders.

### Community Descriptions/LEP Analysis

To address potential or existing environmental justice areas, Bureau staff completed an initial screening of the potentially affected communities using the EJSCREEN tool developed by the EPA. This tool helps identify communities with demographic factors which may benefit from a variety of approaches for notification and outreach communication.

Table 1 summarizes the demographics of potentially affected communities analyzed using the EJSCREEN tool, including the proportion of limited English proficiency persons.

Using the results of the EJSCREEN ACS Summary Report, San Juan County and the area immediately surrounding San Juan Generating Station include areas which may benefit from additional public participation support. Two areas were analyzed: (1) a 4-mile buffer surrounding the San Juan Generating Station; and (2) all of San Juan County. San Juan County was included in the analysis, since the EPA designation that depends on continued reporting is for the county.

The results of the EJSCREEN analysis are as follows:

1. A higher percentage of the population in the affected communities have a lower per capita income, compared to state and national demographic data;
2. Compared to national demographic data, these areas have a higher population of minorities, although the proportion of minorities are lower than the State average;
3. Compared to national demographic data, these areas have higher populations not speaking English at home, although the proportion is lower than the State average;
4. The 4-mile buffer community comprises 1% of individuals who speak English “less than very well” and who do not speak English at home – the “Limited English Proficient individuals.” This is a significantly lower percentage than the State average of 6%;
5. San Juan County has 6% of individuals considered to be “Limited English Proficient individuals.” This is the same percentage as the State average.
6. Only 1% of households in the 4-mile buffer are considered “linguistically isolated,” while 4% in San Juan County are considered so. Both are lower than the State average of 5%.

No meetings are anticipated, as this project should garner little attention. Should a meeting be requested, NMED will respond with an update to this Public Involvement Plan, including further outreach efforts to announce the meeting and a contingency plan, should we be unable to hold the meeting, due to unforeseen circumstances. A hearing will not be required.

To help incorporate the language and communication needs of this community when conducting public outreach, the Bureau will provide public service announcements to nearby Chapter Governments of the Navajo Nation and to a Navajo radio station. This will consist of public comment notices to make public

participation efforts as inclusive as possible within Bureau budget and time limitations. Notices will include information on how to request additional materials in another language or how to request other communication assistance through NMED. These outreach efforts are outlined more in depth below.

In addition, persons with disabilities may request additional services and arrangements necessary for participation in all public involvement activities by using the information provided in the “Contacts” and “Document Repositories” sections of this Plan.

### Details of Outreach Activities

The public may ask questions about this project at any time, regardless of the public comment period. However, to be included in the administrative record, comments solicited by public notices must be submitted during the noticed comment periods in accordance with the requirements of the public notice. Additionally, the public may request to review official project documents at the Bureau or through one of the document repositories listed below.

As discussed above, materials will be distributed to Navajo-speaking entities. The Bureau has concluded, through a separate analysis, that materials will not be translated into a language other than English.

The NMED field offices will serve as access areas for the Bureau to leave hard copies of important documents and information about how to comment on the proceeding as well as instructions to access this information electronically. Specific repository addresses are provided on page 6.

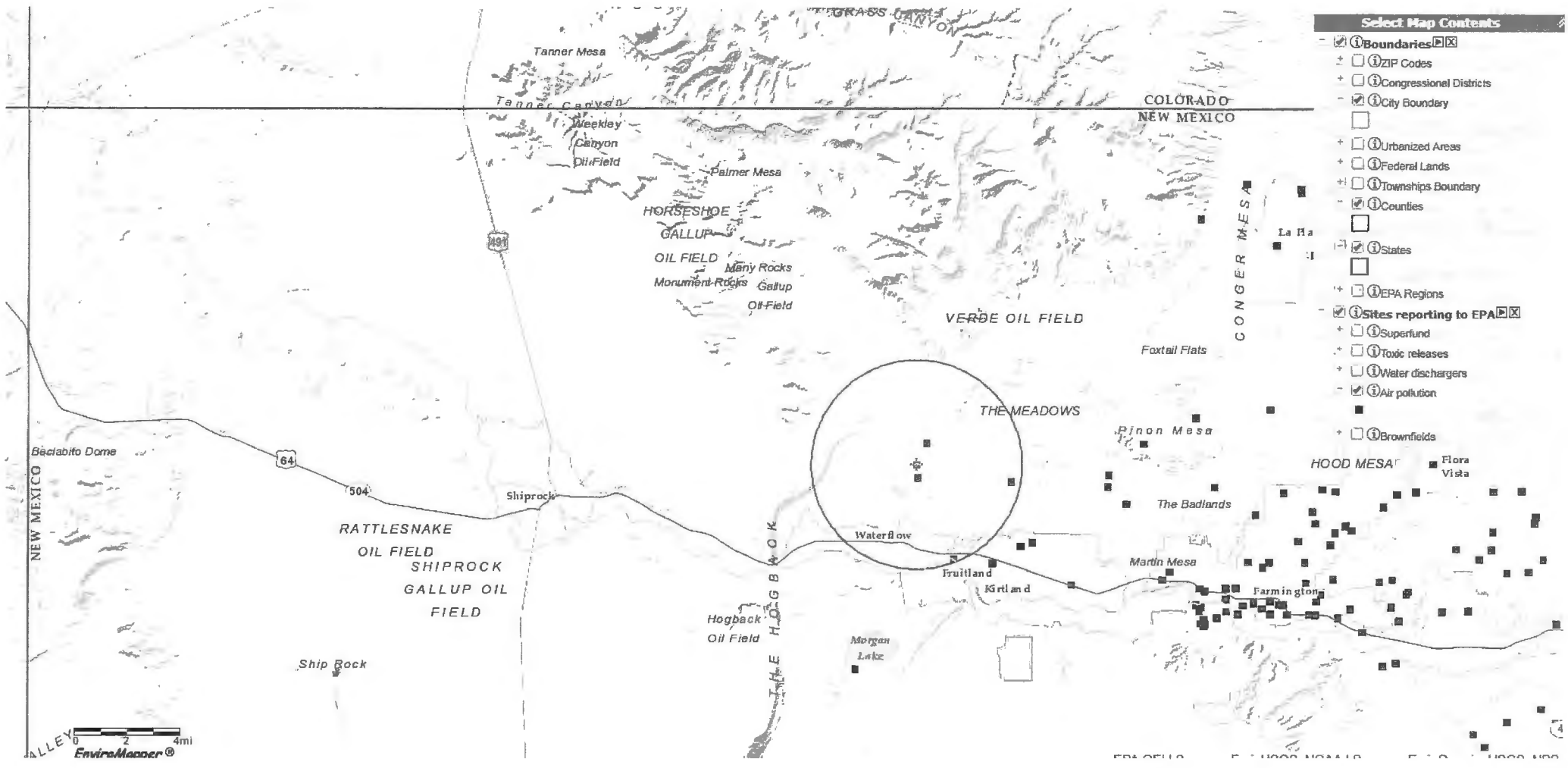

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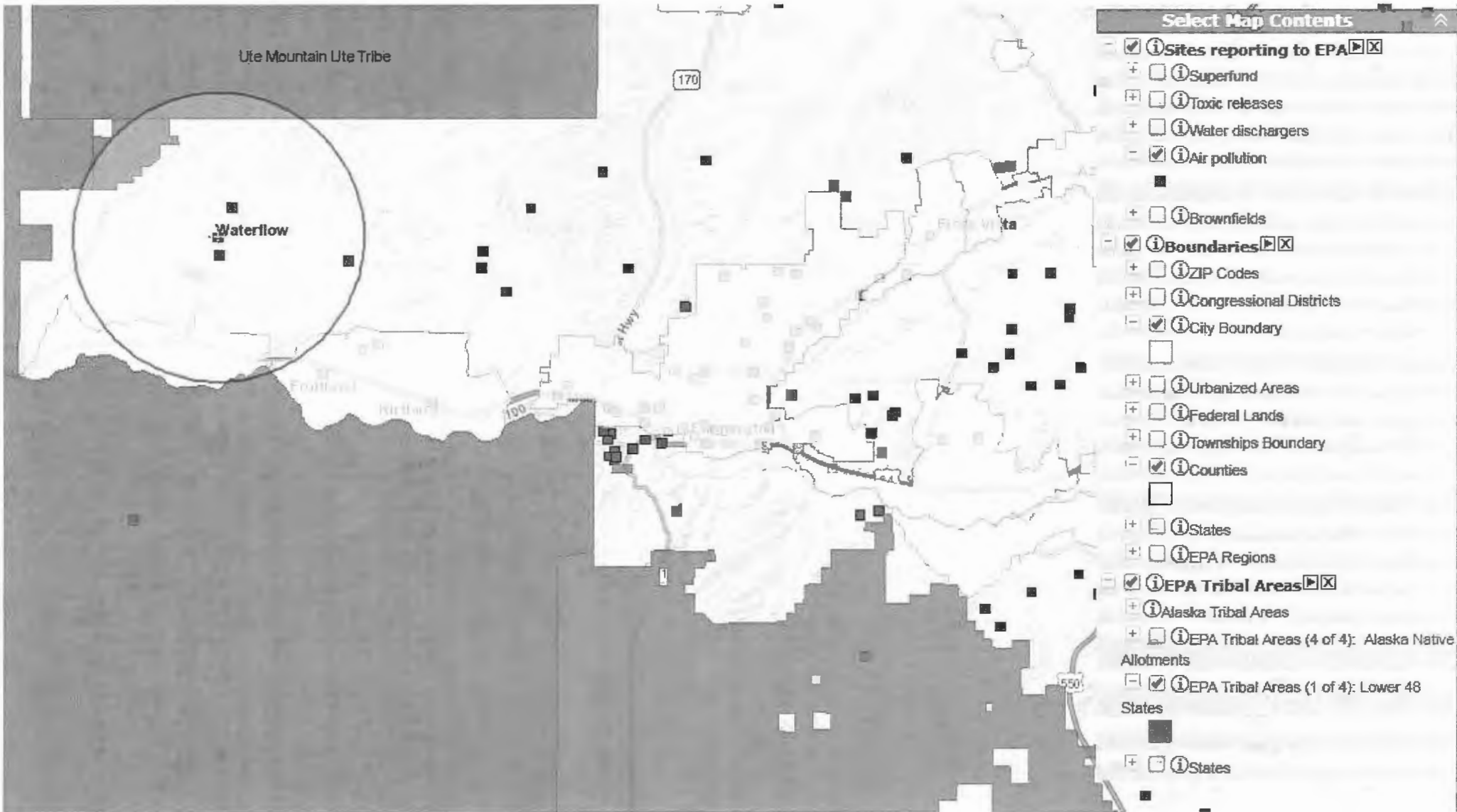
